Opening and Welcome Remarks

The meeting was called to order at 10:30 am by the Municipal Manager, who welcomed attendees and provided context for the meeting. He emphasized the importance of the Annual Progress Implementation Report (PIR) as a tool for evaluating performance, promoting transparency, and informing future planning.

The Municipal manager of the Kilgoris Municipal Board officially opened the meeting, underscoring the municipality's commitment to inclusive development aligned with Kenya Vision 2030, the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA), and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Confirmation of Quorum

The Municipal manager confirmed that the quorum as stipulated in the Municipal Governance Charter was achieved, with attendance from:

- Representatives from Narok County Government
- Heads of technical departments (Planning, Infrastructure, Environment, Health, Water, etc.)
- Civil society organizations and NGOs
- Business community representatives
- Youth and women leaders
- Local faith-based organizations (FBOs)
- Representatives from marginalized and special interest groups

Review and Adoption of the Meeting Agenda

The agenda was presented by the Municipal Manager. After review and a motion for approval, it was adopted unanimously without amendments.

Presentation of FY 2023/2024 Annual Progress Report

The Physical Planner presented the key highlights of the Annual Progress Report for the FY 2023/2024. The report was structured around the priority areas outlined in the Kilgoris Integrated Urban Development Plan (IDeP) 2024–2029.

Key achievements included:

- Completion of the Kilgoris LPLUDP (awaiting gazettement)
- Rehabilitated 10km of gravel and murram roads in Kilgoris Central and Shartuka
- Public sensitization workshops on environmental conservation in Lolgorian and Keyian
- Establishment of a street lighting pilot project in Nkararo
- Water infrastructure enhancement through borehole projects in Osinoni and Poroko

Sectoral Implementation Highlights

a. Urban Infrastructure & Transport:

- Improved 8.5km of urban access roads.
- Initiated design for NMT facilities in Kilgoris CBD.
- Drainage improvement works commenced in Shartuka and Olalui.

b. Water and Sanitation:

- Drilled and equipped 3 boreholes with solar pumps.
- Constructed 2 communal sanitation blocks.
- Lack of sewer system remains a major gap.

c. Environmental Management:

- 5,000 indigenous trees planted in riparian zones.
- Environmental clubs established in 8 primary schools.
- Challenges with illegal dumping persist.

d. Housing and Urban Planning:

- · Completion of informal settlements mapping exercise.
- Draft low-income housing policy framework under development.

e. Health and Social Services:

- Renovation of 2 dispensaries.
- Maternal health outreach programs held in underserved areas.

f. Economic Development:

- Nkararo and Mutenkuar markets rehabilitated.
- 120 traders trained on micro-enterprise management.

Stakeholder Feedback and Engagement

Stakeholders were given the floor to share observations, concerns, and suggestions:

- "When will the construction of the public toilets in Nkararo be completed?"
 Response: Works are expected to be finalized by the second quarter of FY 2024/2025.
- "Can the municipality provide subsidized garbage collection services for lowincome areas?"
 - Response: The board will explore partnerships with private collectors and community-based waste enterprises.
- "What is being done to address the poor state of roads during rainy seasons?"
 Response: Road grading is scheduled before each rainy season; budgetary provisions have been made for drainage enhancement.
- "Are there plans to establish a vocational training center in Shartuka?"
 Response: A feasibility study is underway and funding proposals have been submitted to the county.
- "How can youths participate in municipal project planning?"
 Response: Youth will be formally included through a Municipal Youth
 Advisory Committee to be constituted this year.

All feedback was documented and will be incorporated into the 2024/2025 planning cycle.

Identification of Challenges, Gaps and Lessons Learned

Challenges:

- Funding disbursement delays from the County Treasury
- Inadequate technical personnel in key departments
- Weak inter-agency coordination
- · Low community uptake of sustainability initiatives

Lessons Learned:

- Early engagement improves stakeholder ownership
- GIS data greatly enhances planning accuracy
- Continuous monitoring prevents project overruns

Recommendations and Way Forward

- 1. Prioritize funding for water and sanitation infrastructure
- 2. Establish an inter-agency implementation taskforce
- 3. Scale up sensitization campaigns on urban waste management
- 4. Roll out participatory budgeting at ward level
- 5. Develop a centralized digital M&E dashboard for project tracking

A.O.B

- The Municipal Manager recognized the efforts of environmental volunteers and proposed awards.
- Suggestion to hold semi-annual IDeP performance forums.
- Proposal to form a Municipal Youth Advisory Committee was accepted.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 1600 hrs. The manager thanked all attendees for their participation and reaffirmed the municipality's commitment to responsive and transparent urban governance.
